Street Level

Street Level was established in 1994 as an outreach project in Carluke by six of the town's churches, including St John's, acting together to meet and engage with young people *on the streets*.

The Youth Centre, based at 37 Stewart Street, opened in 1998 in conjunction with Universal Connections - the youth service of South Lanark Council. The fundamental aim was to give the young people of Carluke a safe place to develop. Now, over twenty years later, Street Level continues to provide a vital resource for many local young people.

Services offered by Street Level include: After School groups, Drop In groups and support for Young Carers. It is managed and supported by the churches and receives much of its funding from CHOICES Charity Shop. Financial support is also given by South Lanarkshire Council, and in the past year, the local branch of the TSB chose Street Level as their sponsored charity. Various local businesses, also agreed to have collecting cans on their counters. Two such businesses, who each raised around £500 are The Wee Thackit and James Chapman, Butcher.

Christian Aid

Only a year after Sierra Leone began its recovery from the Ebola crisis, which killed 4000 people, a mud slide swept away homes on the outskirts of its capital Freetown a few weeks ago. Mass graves have been dug for nearly 500 victims,



including 156 children, while rescue workers continue to find and search for more bodies buried in the mud. It's reported that 600 people are still missing, and contamination and disease will spread if these bodies are not recovered. 3000 people are homeless and hundreds of children have been orphaned in what is being described as a humanitarian emergency. In their initial response, Christian Aid's partners distributed food and other essential items, such as malaria nets and basic household items.

16 million people across South Sudan, Ethiopia, Kenya and Somalia urgently need food, as people are dying from hunger and malnutrition across East Africa, in the worst humanitarian crisis since 1945. The situation is deteriorating rapidly as this major catastrophe is unfolding.

It's a sad indictment on the world today, that the food crisis in East Africa, the mudslide in Sierra Leone, the plight of Syrian and other refugees, are yesterday's news, currently dominated by UK and USA politics, lottery winners of 758 million dollars and obscene transfer fees of footballers !

Christian Aid has welcomed Pope Francis' call for more to be done for the massive numbers of people who have been forced to leave their homes due to persecution, violence, natural disasters and the scourge of poverty. This comes as Christian Aid states that the UN agreements are set to ignore the largest group of people forced to flee – the forgotten 40 million people displaced within their own countries, who make up the majority of the 65 million people fleeing their homes worldwide.

This year you raised £13,350 (£12,410 from Christian Aid Week and £938 from the Christmas service) towards Christian Aid's efforts in these areas of deprivation. Thank you for your continued support.

The Murrays in Thailand

Now established in their new home in Chiangmai, the Murrays set to working. Scott started lecturing to Qualified doctors in July, and later including medical students. He is making contact with other medical colleagues in the Medical School and taking every opportunity to share the Gospel.

Plans are in place for Scott to take a trip to the Jungle School of Medicine, in Burma, during the first 2 weeks of October. It will be a 3-day trek to the hospital! Initially, he will train some of the medical staff to do hernia repairs but is prepared to take on anything that presents itself.

Nok, who had been given a job in Grace Elementary School, as a school nurse, has been asked to meet the Principal with a view to moving to teaching, because of a shortage of teachers. As there are two other nurses, Nok feels that the move would be the right thing to do.

Shane graduated high school with *High Honours*, meaning that he scored the equivalent of straight As in the last four years of high school. He had been offered a place in Dnudee University to study electronic engineering, but has decided to accept a place to study Aviation at Moody Bible College instead. He feels that this is the correct choice and that God is leading him. He will need to move to Spokane, Washington, USA. He applied for his Visa in July and, assuming that was successful, his course started in August.

Scott asks for your prayers as these life adjustments are being made by members of his family, including the return of Ray to the parental home for his final year at high school.

One Small Step

It was a real privilege for me to have been asked to organise and lead our Wednesday night fellowship group earlier in the year. The study theme was John Ortberg's "*If you want to walk on water you've got to get out of the boat*". It was split into 6 weekly sessions for study based on Matthew's Gospel 14:22-33 Please read the passage as it will help you to understand what I'm writing about.

1. What's water walking? Well only two people have done it. The story is a parallel of our own lives.

When all is well, we feel secure in our comfort zone. Happy in our normal relationships. Helpful, familiar, content with ourselves. It was no different for Peter and the others. Enter fear. Instead of a nice cosy boat trip it turned into their worst nightmare. Enter Jesus. Knowing how impetuous Peter is, you would expect him to jump overboard and swim to Jesus or call out to Him for rescue. No, he actually engages his brain first. "Lord if it is you, command me to come to you on the water". You might feel that Peter was a failure. After all he panicked and felt safer in the boat.

But think about this: Only Peter knew the glory of walking on water. Only Peter knew the experience of the Glory of God. Only Peter knew the glory of being lifted up by Jesus in the moment of desperate need. Only Peter had that shared moment, that shared connection, that shared trust in Jesus that none of the others had. And there's more: Peter didn't ask for a promise "*Lord promise me I won't sink*". He wanted to be with the Lord. It's the same for us when we face the storms in our lives. Do we seek safety, comfort, help through our own, or do we follow Peter's example when he cried out "*Lord save me*"?

So, what *is* water walking? Well, we have to take that first step. Before that we have to know God, and who Jesus is. We have got to get out of the boat. It's the only way to real growth. After all, the water is where Jesus is.

2. Tragedy of the unopened gift. We all have something in our possession that we don't want to use because of the fear of losing it. It's the same with God given gifts. There are many and varied sinful patterns of behaviour that hinder us or prevents us from cultivating our abilities, gifts or talents that God

has given us. Fear of failure can make us put it off until later. That's when we look back at missed opportunities and see a failure to recognise a world of desperate need and a Great God calling us to be part of something bigger than ourselves. We see the person we could have been. It's never too late to use or develop the gift God has given us. Begin by taking the wrapper off. Take the first step.

3. Find your calling/Get your feet wet. First we must have a personal relationship with Jesus and recognise that God is in control. Good indicators to enable us to discern God's calling are :- ***Fear*** - Courage to take risks and wisdom to know which risks to take. Face your fears; ***Frustration*** - No project or personal journey comes without frustration or anxiety; ***Compassion*** - Deep awareness to bear or suffer; ***Prayer*** - The forefront and the channel that allows us to know and understand God's calling. Daily dialogue with God. Plans can change.

4. Facing our Challenges, Conquering our fear. God never puts us in a position where He knows we are lacking. God always equips us. The reason why Peter started sinking and looked for the safety of the boat is because he took his eyes off Jesus. So we ask ourselves; *Am I going on my own strength, am I being misled by some other spiritual paralysis, have I looked the other way?* Peter may have taken the easy option but he still recognised the Saviour enough to cry out "*Lord save me*" and He did. It wasn't after a period where Jesus thought to himself "*I'll let him swallow half of the sea to teach him a lesson*". It was immediate.

If we take our eyes off Jesus, I'm afraid we will have a lot of calling out to do. We still have to face our Challenges, get over our hurdles. Think of a hurdler. He or she can knock over some or all of the hurdles and still win the race. They don't quit if they down the first hurdle.

Fear of failure is massive. It is instrumental for our lack of success. A barrier rather than a hurdle. It stops us from doing things that can move us forward. Unless we have guarantees of success or perfection, we give up trying. When God leads us to step out in an area to do something new, or leads us to make a bigger commitment, we will feel fear. The time will eventually come when

we will have to face our fear and not run away from it. Better still, put our trust in Him, take His hand and go forward.

5. Good news for Cave Dwellers. We all know what a cave is. They appear to be dark, dreary, damp and sinister places where we wouldn't like to stay. Our 'caves' can be dark and sinister too. We don't want to be there but sadly we can find ourselves in one so easily. Bad situations, fear of failure, disappointment, low self-esteem. All of these and more can drive us into our 'caves'. We can't fix, heal or escape them. Relationships fall apart, marriages fail, jobs terminate and the list goes on. We feel that there is no way out.

The Good News is God does all His best work when we are in our cave. He doesn't want us to be there in the first place. He didn't put us there, we managed that on our own. Our Great God is a God of refuge, hope, encouragement, a God of Power who never ceases to redeem all things. No matter how deep or dark the cave in which we find ourselves, God is with us. The hand that reached down to pluck Peter from the stormy water is always there too for any one of us in our cave.

6. Learning to wait on our Big God.

When human beings get out of the boat, they are never quite the same. Every time you walk on the water, each time you trust God and seek to discern and obey His calling on your life, your God gets bigger and your worship will grow deeper, richer and stronger.

How big is God? If you look through a telescope the wrong way then you get the picture of how some people perceive God: small and distant. They are not convinced that they are absolutely safe in the hands of an all-knowing, ever-present God.

Fixing our eyes on Jesus was consistent through-out each session and in this last one it makes it so much easier to wait with hope. Stepping out of the boat doesn't mean that immediately everything will be plain sailing. It may mean dark, anxious periods in our waiting. That's when we have to stay focused on our Great Big God. Waiting is part of the process of becoming what God wants us to be. We live in an age where no one seems to want to

wait. We don't want to queue anymore. At a bus stop, people may just to hang around hoping to catch everyone out and get on first. How many times have you been in a supermarket check-out queue only to find it not moving? So you jump into another only to find the one you left is now rapidly moving. It's difficult to wait. That's why if we want to do what God has called us to do, we usually want to do it as quickly and successfully as possible.

God wants us to wait on Him. In the story of Peter and the disciples in the boat, Jesus knew when to wait and when to act. He waited until early morning before He went out to the boat. He acted immediately when He pulled Peter out of the water. By waiting we learn to depend on our Great Big God and we also learn valuable lessons about faith, prayer, obedience and trust that will change our lives forever.

*My God is so big, so strong and so mighty
There's nothing my God cannot do.*

Bigger than anything we can imagine, small enough to fit into our heart. Big enough to answer all our needs, small enough to hear our whispered prayer.

There you have it. 6 easy lessons to put into practice but with degrees of difficulty :- Overcoming fear of failure; Questioning faith; Lack of positivity; Going on own strength; Low self-esteem. All of these things can be overcome by taking that first step, believing and trusting that the hand that reached out to Peter is always there waiting in readiness for each one of us. When Peter got out of the boat he experienced walking at its finest. So then, back to the question: "*What is water walking?*" (You write your own answer!)

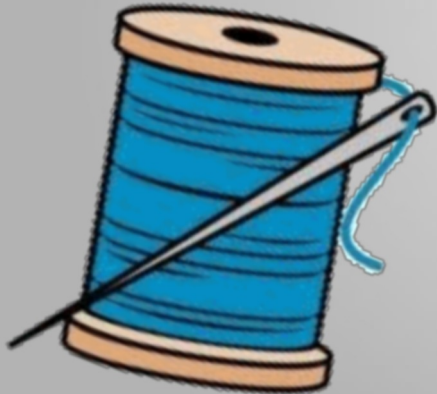
What on earth am I here for?
