### Joint Kirk Session Gathering

Earlier this month, all four Kirk Sessions from St John's, St Andrew's, Kirkton and Law met together in our hall to hear from some of the groups who undertake missional work on our behalf. There were more than 60 people at the event and everyone was encouraged by how much we had in common and what a positive feeling there was amongst those present about the future shape of the church in Carluke and Law.

It is hoped that another gathering of the Kirk Sessions will take place after the summer.

In the meantime the cluster group (representatives of the four congregations) will continue to meet and begin to consider how to move things forward.

### The church in Carluke & Law

Over the past year or so discussions have been ongoing about the future shape of the church in Carluke and Law. These discussions came about as a result of a decision of the General Assembly to recognise the need for change, considering, the reducing size of congregations and the lack of new ministers.

The discussions in Carluke and Law also recognised the many ways in which the churches have worked together over the years through joint services and joint missional work including Street level, Choices, Carluke Listeners, the Foodbank the summer holiday club and Christian Aid week.

St John's are already in a deferred union with St Andrew's and we expect that union to take place at some point in the near future following the retiral of Rev Helen Jamieson on 31<sup>st</sup> August. That will be the first step in this process.

The four congregations have met frequently and following the agreement of all four Kirk Sessions it is proposed that one united congregation will be established for Carluke and Law. The new congregation will use the building that is currently used by Kirkton as their place of worship. Law will be retained for missional activity and it is anticipated that in due course the buildings owned by St John's and St Andrew's will be sold. The congregation will be served by two Ministers of Word and Sacrament operating as a team alongside a part time children and families worker.

This position was recently agreed by Presbytery and the full Presbytery Mission Plan has now been sent to the relevant departments for approval.

This has been a difficult decision for the Kirk Session but it has long been the view of St John's that one united congregation is the best way forward to fulfil God's mission in our community.

Ultimately this will be subject to a congregational vote but we hope that the congregation will agree to the decision of the Kirk Session and look forward to what this united congregation can do for God's mission in Carluke and Law.

## Time for fellowship

The time for fellowship has been a great success every Sunday morning where we can all catch up. Enjoying a wee cup of tea and a big blether with all our friends at church.

It is with great thanks that I have the special help from all my teams who are there when needed to serve tea and coffee every week. I would also like to thank Ian and all who help put tables up and take them away after we are finished. Also when possible the Boys Brigade put tables up on a Friday night if the hall is not being used on the Saturday.

Like everyone, the Church's finances have been affected by recent events (COVID and the energy crisis). Members giving's have been steady in recent years but not returned to pre COVID levels. A saving factor in our income has been our Gift Aid recovered from the taxman and this has basically kept us afloat over the past 2 years.

If you are a taxpayer and don't already use Gift Aid then please consider doing so since we can recover a bonus of 20p for every pound you give at no extra cost to you. Speak to any elder and they will pass on your details and we can set that up for you.

Our heating costs are a major factor in our expenditure and these have doubled in the past year which puts a considerable strain on our resources. The maintenance of the Church and manse are considerable ongoing costs to us.

The next few years will present considerable challenges to us but together we can work our way through to a brighter future . Jack Battison (Finance Convenor)


#### Jesus loves me ..... for older folks

## Clydesdale Food Bank

**Clydesdale Food Bank** has been working since March 2013 to bring relief to those unable to buy food for themselves or their families. During that time, the demand has increased tenfold.



The initial problem was the repercussions of the financial crash of 2008 which made life worse for those in poverty. Demand increased steadily till 2019. In 2020 the pandemic had a dramatic effect and now the rapid rise in the cost of living and the energy crisis are still causing serious issues.

As the name suggests, we cover all of Clydesdale, an area of approximately 500 square miles, spanning from Law to Elvanfoot, Coalburn to Dolphinton. All requests must come by referral from an outside agency like Social Work, Citizens Advice, Money Matters, Health service, schools, churches or some partner charities. Food packs are then delivered to the client's home with enough food to last from 10-14 days.

The pack includes tins, dried foods, personal and household hygiene items but also fresh food. Supplies come from donations in special collections, or from the donation points in numerous supermarkets around Clydesdale. For the first few years, these physical donations were sufficient to cover the needs. Financial

donations were used to meet other operating costs such as rent, insurance, telephone etc. Sadly, this is no longer the case and in 2023 the food bank spent £138,230 (£86,647 in 2022) on food alone just to make sure there was enough in stock to meet demand. This was coupled with a drop in income from £159,013 in 2022 to £136,248 in 2023. This is of great concern as our reserves have now fallen to under the threshold of 6 months operating costs. Having said that, the trustees are enormously grateful to the community for their continued support at a time when everyone is being affected by rising costs.

The trustees are actively seeking grant funding and have also embarked on a fundraising campaign at markets and events throughout Clydesdale. All of this requires volunteers to help outside our normal working hours - an hour or so can make a difference.

On a personal note, I have been chairperson of Clydesdale Food Bank since it started in 2013 and since 2020 I have been full time coordinator. It is time for me to pull back and let the rest of our very capable team take over the day-to-day running. I feel pretty proud of this team and what this organisation has achieved and I have every confidence that it will continue to meet the inevitable challenges as they arise. Our dream of the food bank not being needed does not look any nearer to fulfilment at present but it will continue to ease the pressure on the lives of those we serve. I intend to withdraw from everyday involvement at the end of May but I will continue as a trustee meantime, providing background support. We have added a couple of long standing volunteers to the trustees and they and the other trustees have been working out a sensible division of roles going forward. Please keep them and the whole organisation in your prayers and continue to support the food bank in any way you can — with physical or financial donations or by volunteering your time and your talents.

## 3 minute reflection on gardens

I really like to spend time gardening. As I realise this topic may not instantly inspire too many people, I am going to take on the task of convincing you why gardening is a good thing by using three words: Physical, Peace and Philosophy.

#### First up is physical.

I like to work in a garden. I have owned two houses now, and each time I have moved in, my back garden could easily have been the setting for a movie about the Battle of the Somme. I was greeted each time by a sea of mud. Perhaps more by need rather than want, I started to work in my garden. And I have found it can be great fun.

I don't think there is anything better than going through the process from design concept to reality to make a wasted space into a garden. I love to lay slabs in patterns, I have laid bases for huts, I have built low walls and bedding boxes, I have painted fences. Maybe the attraction might be to using power tools? I don't really know, but my mantra has been 'How hard can it be? Let's give it a go and find out.'

I don't pretend to have green fingers, and I do like plants that grow on their own. I don't pretend to be an expert – I am just an enthusiastic experimenter. I use one easy rule when buying a plant – how much does it cost? As then I can judge how much I am willing to lose!

#### My second word was Peace.

The great thing about a garden is that you <u>don't</u> have to work in it all the time. There is always opportunity to down tools and relax in that space. During Covid I felt very blessed to be outside in the garden with a bit of peace. Gardens *are* peaceful. But you don't need to sit and watch the grass grow, as gardens are also always very active. I like to listen for my resident blackbird in full song, or to spot if the fearless wee robin is around. This is a very nice way to spend an hour for sure.

#### My third and final word was Philosophy.

Gardens can teach you lessons and when sitting at peace in a garden there is time for thinking. However, the philosophy I want to share for the moment is simply this: when it comes to gardening – and potentially also for our life or faith journeys - you get out what you put in. And on that basis, why not give it our best shot?

Ekwendeni hospital was able to purchase essential drugs such as painkillers, inhalers, insulin and the like thanks to some money going there. In addition, members of our congregation collected bandages, paracetamol, towels, sheets and blankets which were sent via the Banana Box Trust to the hospital.



One of the biggest challenges facing Malawi is climate change. This picture shows the recent devastation flooding has caused last month when torrential rain swept through the country. Homes, crops and livelihoods were washed away. Money was given to help plant trees that will help improve soil and in time mitigate, in some small way, against the impact of

climate change and save people facing these horrendous floods every year.

As you can see money goes a long way in Malawi and we are again holding a café on Gala Day from 10am - 1.30pm. There will be hot rolls, salads and home baking so come along with friends and family and help raise money to support some of the poorest people in the world.

### CHOICES (Churches Helping Others in Christian Evangelical Service)

The shop began 30 years ago . St. John's was celebrating its 150th anniversary and the ladies of the Guild felt called to do something to help the community.

At that time Ravenscraig Steelworks was closing which had a knock on effect on our town. Driven by its first manager Anne Forrest and her supporting team it opened its first shop in February 1993.

The other Churches also saw the need and quickly joined in with their help. Soon a team of around 80 volunteers were doing their bit to help those in need. Volunteers came from the local churches...St John's, St Andrew's, Kirkton, URC, St Athanasius & Law as well as many with no church connection but a desire to help.

It has been well supported by the town with donations and has given much appreciated help to those in need or just looking for a reasonably priced item which was no longer needed by someone else.

Over the past 31 years an amazing total of £1.1 million has been raised. After running costs and shop improvements, over £700,000 has been donated to local, national & international causes. Notably among these have been Christian Aid, Clydesdale Food Bank, St Andrews Hospice and Carluke Gala Day. We were also able to support various Disaster Appeals over the years.

However the biggest beneficiary has been the local Churches Project with £572,000 going to support youth work in the town through Street Level.

We now have a Facebook page to help publicise events and advise of special sales and opening hours.

All of this would not have been possible without the hard work of the staff, the support of the town in physical and monetary donations and our many clients from far and wide.

We are always looking for new staff and if you feel you want to be involved in this project please get in touch with the shop. It can be for as few or as many hours as you can spare.

### **Carluke Listeners**

#### **Background**

In 2010, the Church of Scotland in Carluke conducted a Mission Audit of the town with a view to finding out how the church could serve the community. As a result of this Mission Audit, offering a 'listening ministry' was agreed as one of the Mission Priorities.

A program of Listening Training began and in 2013, when the Rev Elizabeth Clelland, an experienced listener and listening tutor, agreed to act as our supervisor, a 'listening service' was rolled out.

Currently in Carluke there are 8 trained, supervised listeners gathered from St Andrew's, Kirkton, St John's and Carstairs churches.

Listening in Carluke is a Christian ministry. All our listeners are faithful Christians. Christians aim to follow the example of Christ and throughout his life Jesus was an amazing listener giving people he met his undivided attention. He sat at the well and listened to the woman from Samaria. He spent an evening with Nicodemus listening to his questions. Even on the cross he heard his mother's pain and offered John as a new son.

#### What is Listening

Sometimes we have a need to talk over what is on our mind, tell our story, tell someone how we are feeling. At those times, we need to know that the person, who listens to us, won't judge us or criticise us; won't try to correct us or give us advice; won't interrupt us or take over and tell their own story. Instead that they will value and respect us; give us full attention; empower us to reach our own decisions and of course treat everything we say in strict confidence. That is listening.

Listeners are often asked about the difference between a 'conversation' and 'active listening'.

A conversation involves taking turns at talking and listening and as this happens the focus changes from person to person

During listening, the listener sets aside their own agenda and focuses entirely on speaker – their words, their body language, their silences and even their tears. The listener does not offer advice but leads the speaker to make their own decisions. When you are listening, you are actively trying to hear something,

you are putting effort into hearing and understanding what the speaker is saying, experiencing and feeling.

Here is a quote from Stephen R Covey (1932 – 2012)

'Most people do not listen with the intent to understand. They listen with the intent to reply'

So instead of concentrating on, and thinking about, what the person is saying, most people are already thinking about and planning their reply. Two dialogues are going on at the same time – one being spoken and one being prepared in the other persons head. Not much listening going on there!

#### Safety is a priority

All listeners are trained, supervised and assessed on a regular basis
A governance group is in place to monitor protocols, procedures and practices
All listeners have completed Applied Suicide Intervention Skills Training

#### What we currently offer

Face to Face listening sessions in a safe, confidential space within St John's Church building. Drop-in sessions are available every Thursday morning between 10.00am and 11.30am. Appointments can be arranged at other times. Face to face sessions at Street Level during the family session organised by the Youth, Family and Community Learning team on Mondays between 4.00pm and 5.30pm

Telephone listening sessions, Zoom video listening sessions In exceptional circumstances a 'Listening at Home Service' is available
